Course Description

In this course, students will gain an introduction to the scientific study of human behavior and mental processes. Topics may be drawn from historical and current perspectives in psychology. Such topics might include neuroscience; sensation and perception; states of consciousness; learning; memory; intelligence; motivation and emotion; personality; development; psychological disorders/treatment; and health psychology.

Plagiarism

• Plagiarism in this course, and at FGC is unacceptable, and **strictly prohibited**.



- Plagiarism is the practice of using another person's ideas, words, and work, while submitting as your own. Plagiarism is also known as (a/k/a): copying, piracy, theft, stealing, appropriation, cribbing, and poaching. It includes using direct quotes, while not citing the source, not using in-text citations, and/or a reference page.
- The utilization of Artificial Intelligence (AI) as one's work is considered plagiarism. This includes use to obtain better wording, sentence restructuring, paraphrasing, etc.
- Using Grammarly, or any similar system to re-phrase, word, write, "make it sound better", etc., is prohibited.
- It is imperative that the student submit their own work, words, and writing as the spirit of these assignments is to assess knowledge of




subject matter and critical thinking, while developing communication skills and abilities re: writing.


- Note: This is Gordon Rule course (FL law), which mandates that students in Florida's postsecondary (college) institutions demonstrate college-level communication (the student's written words), and computation skills – your skills, not that of a system, or with assistance.
- All writing assignments will be checked for plagiarism via the Turnitin system, which the student will acknowledge upon submission of the assignment in Canvas. This system assesses and alerts the student and instructor (at higher levels) for plagiarism.
- Students whose papers are flagged for the instructor must be prepared to provide additional information for review, e.g., version histories, information re: detailed process on how they wrote the paper, etc.
- Evidence and determination of plagiarism will result in a nonnegotiable grade of zero for the assignment, with possible institutional sanctions, e.g., failure of the course, expulsion from the college, etc.
 - The matter is non-negotiable as the student, via the syllabus, has knowledge of what is and is not acceptable re: plagiarism, as well as acknowledges, prior to submission, that the assignment has not been plagiarized. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that they do not plagiarize.
- Students will not be permitted the opportunity to re-submit the plagiarized assignment. Time simply does not permit for such. Requesting to do so could result in additional course points lost (see Rabbit Hole deductions.

Due Dates & Deadlines

- This course is offered in a very achievable cadence/rhythm, so long as the student does not procrastinate. Procrastination is a personal human behavior, that only the person (who procrastinates) can address/change.
- Modules will "lock" and be inaccessible to students after the established and published deadline. The modules lock at 11:59 p.m., EST/EDT.
- Deadlines (due dates) are an important aspect of life, especially in our professional endeavors, e.g., college endeavors, careers, etc.
 - A component of the college experience includes preparation beyond the academic subject matter, e.g., time management, meeting deadlines, developing contingency plans, etc.
 - o Adherence to deadlines is important for time management on the part of the student and the instructor.
 - A student's failure to meet deadlines, and subsequent pleas for exceptions, negatively affects and impacts every process and person associated with this course, inclusive of, and primary of which, is the student.



- Modules/assignments are open for one full week. Students should anticipate and plan for technology issues, working ahead and with alternative resources for course accessibility, e.g., library, local "hot spot", etc.
- Consistent, dependable, and unrestricted access to technology, e.g., internet, computer, is a requirement for this online course.





The course is set and cannot be customized for individual student needs and personal schedules. It is the student's responsibility to work their schedule around the course. Late Work See "Grading Policies (Course Performance Measures) for assignments which are and are not eligible for late/grace period submission, yet with sanctions (auto 20% deduction in score for every day late). Students who miss assignments due to unavoidable circumstances, e.g., PAST DUE hospitalization, death in the family, accident, call to military duty, etc., should contact the instructor, providing credible, documentable proof on why the assignments could not be completed in a timely manner. This includes verification of family lineage. Approval of the documentation and allowance of late submission, without penalty, will be at the discretion of the instructor. Failure to provide the documentation and contact the instructor in a timely manner may result in ineligibility, and/or "rabbit hole" penalty deductions. Your instructor reserves the right to make appropriate "rabbit hole" grading Rabbit Hole deductions for students who request late work allowances when not **Grading** applicable, beyond the grace period, and/or without documentation to **Deductions** substantiate just cause, e.g., medical excuse, military orders, etc. Documentation must substantiate just cause, and for the length of time the assignment was open, inclusive of the grace period. Documentation that does not substantiate just cause, and/or represents conflicting dates, cannot be aligned as a direct cause for the student's inability to complete their assignment on time, etc., will result in significant rabbit hole penalties/grade deductions, and at the discretion of your instructor. Time simply does not permit, with such actions taking precious time from all. As such, student-initiated ventures down "rabbit holes" will result in grade deductions at the discretion of the instructor. This course is a Gordon Rule course. In accordance with the State of Gordon Rule Florida's Rule 6A-10.030, all courses designated as Gordon Rule ("GR") Requirement in the college catalog will include the requirement that students demonstrate the ability to produce college-level, discipline-based writings. Such courses include, but are not limited to, those in the Communications, Humanities, and Social Sciences categories. This requirement will be met in each class through the student's successful completion of multiple and substantive college-level writing assignments as designed and assessed by the instructor in such a way as to measure both course-specific learning and development of writing skills over the progress of a given semester. In addition to demonstrating a satisfactory understanding of the written English language, all such assignments submitted by a student should exhibit critical thinking skills and be directly related to the discipline's specific General Learning Outcome(s). Plagiarism, inclusive of the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI), will be graded in context with the course/college policy, e.g., non-negotiable grade of zero.

- 3. as evidence in or in preparation for a criminal or civil proceeding.

Students are not permitted to record in class, through any means over any medium, any academic or other activity that is not a class lecture. A recording of any meeting or conversation between students, or between students and faculty, is strictly prohibited unless all parties have consented to such recording. A recording of a class lecture may not be published without the prior express written consent of the recorded faculty member.

College Course Withdrawal and Drop Process

A course may be dropped only during the published add/drop period. After add/drop, students must withdrawal from their course. Please visit the <u>College Catalog</u> for more detailed information about the drop and withdrawal process.

Students are responsible for withdrawing by the published deadline. Students must allow sufficient time for the process to be completed. The fully approved withdrawal form is due to Registration & Records by 4:30 p.m. on the deadline posted on the <u>Academic Calendar</u> or it is considered late.

To withdraw from a course, the following steps must take place:

- 1. The student will log in to MyFGC and navigate to the Withdrawal form.
- 2. First, click the Student tab; next click Registration; and then click Course Withdrawal Form.
- 3. The student will enter the course information, the instructor's email address, and the advisor's name and email address. Once all information is entered, submit the form.
- 4. The form then routes directly to the instructor for approval and the last date of attendance. Once the instructor has completed their portion, the form will route to the advisor.
- 5. The advisor will complete their portion of the form and submit.
- 6. The form then routes to Registration & Records for processing. The student will receive an email notification to their FGC Wolves email account once this step is completed.
- 7. If the form is denied, the student will be notified by email and should contact the advisor with any questions.

Students are strongly encouraged to begin the withdrawal process the day **before** the withdrawal deadline to allow sufficient time for the process to be completed by all offices involved (Instructor, Advising Services, Financial Aid, Registration & Records).

It is the student's responsibility to understand all financial and academic implications of the withdrawal. Students are permitted a maximum of two (2) withdrawals per course. Upon the third attempt, a student must receive a grade for the course. Absence from class or merely notifying the professor does not constitute withdrawal. A student who stops attending class without withdrawing will receive a grade from the instructor.

Incompletes

Incomplete grades are reserved for students who are unable to complete a course and the withdrawal date has passed. A student should only be issued an incomplete if at least 75% of the course assignments have been submitted and the student can reasonably complete the remaining assignments within the first three weeks of the next term to earn a passing overall grade. Otherwise, students should be issued the earned letter grade in the course at the end of the current term.

The **Incomplete Grade Request Form** must be completed and submitted for approval by the **FIRST** day of Final Exams and BEFORE issuing the "I" grade. The instructor will describe the circumstances leading up to the requested "I" for the course, and list the missing assignments, quizzes, exams, and any other course requirements needed to satisfactorily complete the course **within** the first three weeks of the next term. The form must be signed by the instructor, student, and the Dean/Executive Director over the program. Once all participants have signed, an approval email will be sent to the instructor for authorization to assign the "I" grade.

Student Communication Standards

You are expected to communicate in a professional and respectful tone with the instructor and fellow classmates. All written communication (in email correspondence, discussion forums, assignments, quizzes and exams, etc.) must use proper written English. Please refrain from using online and texting abbreviations and language. Oral communications, if applicable, must be made with a respectful tone and body language. Use proper <u>netiquette</u> throughout!
